Alpha Omega Board Of Trustees Meeting Report March 13th, 2023

The Board of Trustees meeting took place virtually on Zoom on March 13th, 2023. We met to allocate funds for charities who had requested donations from our local chapter. In attendance were:

Laurel Linetsky-Fleisher, Immediate Past President Tammy Herzog, President Andrea Heckler-Treasurer Rick Rodney- Past President Adam Kaplan- Member at Large

The committee mandate was made known to the members in attendance and request letters were distributed prior to the meeting. Funds available this year for disbursement were:

\$19, 825.00

\$10,000 was from budgeted funds that we receive each year from a portion of our dues \$9,825.00 was raised from the sale of our chapter's Charitable Draw tickets. Last year this amount was \$4,200.00 so we were able to raise an additional \$5,625.00 this year. This is likely due to the fact that we had an inperson Half Day Seminar and Charitable Draw event this year so were able to physically sell more tickets to those in attendance. Last year this same event was done virtually due to the Covid-19 restrictions so we didn't have the same success selling the tickets the day of the event virtually. We printed 300 tickets this year and sold a total of 299 tickets. The bulk of tickets are usually sold when dues are paid at the beginning of our year in Aug and the remaining tickets are sold at this event.

We received 4 requests for funds from the following:

DVI- Dental Volunteers for Israel
Beit Issie Shapiro dental clinic for disabled children
About Face

It should be noted that Jewish Family and Child did not request funds last year or this year as they feel the funds they have at the moment are sufficient for their needs. We also did not get a request from Jewish Free Loan who were granted \$3,000.00 last year. After due deliberation the following recommendations were made and adopted:

1.CAMH dental clinic- \$8,000.00

2.DVI- \$7,000.00

3.Beit Issie Shapiro dental clinic- \$2,500.00 4.About Face- \$1,500.00


Total funds distributed: \$19,000.00 Funds remaining in the kitty for future disbursement: \$825.00

A few months ago, I found myself ready to throw my hands in the air and yell out, 'Its no use – We Are Doomed!.' We have had three plus years of Covid with an ocean of waves and an entire Greek alphabet of variants, an incomprehensible invasion of Ukraine, unending grift in USA politic, climate extremes with people running out of water, flooded out of their homes, or escaping from burning mountainsides. Canadian air travel had collapsed, and a fractured supply chain disrupted most normal activities. Residential School atrocities were exposed and a Pope who could not admit that the church had any responsibility. Self-proclaimed Freedom Riders had interfered with both commerce and the freedom of Ottawa citizens and when asked. were unable to explain the freedom they sought. Home prices were sky-rocketing. There were more jobs than job-seekers. Immigration and travel were delayed because our government could not approve visas and passports. Gas prices were yoyoing from way too high to just too high. A scan of popular YouTube sites finds, climate change deniers, young earth creationists, anti-science cults, Moorish and sovereign citizens, flat-earth advocates, farright crazies and also some from the anarchistic far left. If that was not enough, measles, polio and monkeypox cases seem to be on the rise. I do not want to overlook missiles launched indiscriminately from Gaza into Israel, Taliban and Iranian atrocities, the near assassination of Salman Rushdie and live streaming of police brutality. It was unbelievable, that in a UN vote, a few countries sided with Syria to not allow humanitarian aid to flow into the country to address the horrible human catastrophe that resulted from a devastating earthquake. Social and political commentators attempt to find connections between these events- but even if they could- so what.

There used to be a broad, centrist, social/ political philosophy with small black and white extremes. We now have a shrunken central zone with large black and white elements on the right and left. Just tune into the CNN and Fox news and you might think that they are broadcasting from different planets. Even what used to be entertainment has begun to fester. Baseball and basketball players find it unacceptable to play for 25 million dollars a year. An upstart golf association is underwritten by a misogynistic and terror supporting family. Unspeakable behaviour of young hockey players, who lacked or would not follow, ethical mentors. Sport elites, who refused to get vaccinated, shun the public, the very same public which had buoyed their success. I see these issues as mostly self- induced. That is, humans acting or not acting in a manner which lacks consideration for others, having an unwarranted level of self-importance, hiding behind religious fundamentalism, or simply ignoring or unwilling to accept readily available evidence. These matters, although disturbing, being man-made, are potentially correctable.

As we pave over arable land to expand suburbs. fence off huge tracts to graze cattle and sheep, waste more than 30% of the food we grow, we ignore the flora and fauna which had occupied the land. One of the most disturbing sights is to see one of the islands off the west coast of British Columbia, clear-cut exactly in half. The bison which at one time spread across the horizon in the millions, were whittled down to just a handful. Passenger pigeons are no more. Most Canadians will never see a caribou in the wild, let alone beaver, fox, bear, moose, and mountain lion. Ranchers are deforesting the Amazon rain forest, to make space for cattle to graze for a few years until the poor soil is depleted. Great swaths of the Indonesian and Bornean tropical jungles have been cut down to farm palm oil trees. Huge factory fishing ships scour the oceans, each day scooping up more fish than a single fisherman can catch in a lifetime. The tons of by-catch are thrown back dead or processed into pet food. There is no doubt that the animal diversity of our planet is in peril. Natural threats, climate cycles, isolation and a variety of selection pressures have led to unique biological modifications, so that today, every living specie is exquisitely adapted to survive in a specific environment. This is not a new phenomenon; evolution has been a constant factor for billions of years. We know that most of the animals that have walked this

earth have gone extinct. The difference today is that another animal specie is directly affecting the rate of extinction.

We should be heartened to know that we can reverse the trend. Close to home, we have tens of thousands of wild turkeys in Southern Ontario when only 40 years ago there were none. Right whales are on the increase after being decimated to a remnant population. We can purchase some cod again, after intense social, economic, and political intervention. Actually, there are many examples of the successful rescue of single species from extinction. What is rare, is an intervention which is meant to salvage entire ecosystems and the diverse population of flora and fauna which it supports.

Some time ago, I was killing time in a Goodwill book-store, searching for a read when I came across the book 'Good News-For a Change' by David Suzuki and Holly Dressel. Whether you are a fan of David Suzuki or not, he has made a career out of pointing out deficiencies in ecologic management. I have never felt him to be a harbinger of good news. So, I laid down two toonies and took the book home to add to my Covid reading list. The book is really a collection of short non-fiction stories of environmental, political, and social actions which have improved the lot of both humans and animals. They are brief enough so that you can read two or three and return to peruse others at a later date. Hidden in the chapter, titled 'Using Coyotes to Grow Grass' was a piece about the concept of Cores, Corridors and Carnivores. The essay made the point that we cannot think of animals in the wild as just living in a bigger cage than a zoo can provide. Animals move about to find mates, to find food and to find an environment which is conducive to their biologic needs.* Putting aside tracts of tundra to give more space for polar bears is useless if they are unable to reach sea ice. The theory suggests that if we can protect enough space for the predators at the top of the food chain to flourish, the rest of the fauna and flora will thrive. In the next essay, 'Living Together,' I found a brief reference to the Y-2-Y Wildlands Project. I had never heard of it, so I read the reference with some interest. The first Y stands for Yellowstone Park, the American national park which covers about 9,000 km² mostly in the state of Wyoming. The second Y stands for Yukon, the huge Canadian territory of the north-west. In between are two Canadian Parks, Banff, and Jasper. Y-2-Y aims

to link these regulated areas in a continuous corridor of unspoiled land along the spine of the Rocky Mountains. In total this vast stretch of wilderness will enclose more than 43,000 km², although this is not a huge amount of land compared to the size of Canada or the USA, it is still an area larger than Denmark.

*Pluie, a five-year-old female gray wolf, was radio-collared in Peter Lougheed Provincial Park, Alberta, in June 1991. Over the following nine months she traveled over 100,000 square kilometers – an area 15 times larger than Banff Park. She crossed more than 30 political jurisdictions including three states, two provinces, private lands, and First Nation's territories. Pluie was shot and killed in a legal hunt south of Kootenay National Park in December 1995.

Since it would be impossible to actively provide ideal natural space for each and every specie, biologists have identified certain animals which are essential to the health of the biome and are also recognizable to the public. For programs such as Y-2-Y, public support or at least indifference, is essential. In this scheme, Grizzly bears are designated as an Umbrella specie. They require 100-300 km² for nutrition, mating, and rearing offspring. Evidence shows that a healthy bear population is associated with good populations of medium-sized mammals such as lynx, wolf, sheep, and deer. Bears also play a fascinating role in providing nutrients to forests running along the edge of rivers. They bring their fish catch into the forest where they eat the skin and fat and leave behind carcasses to decompose, resulting in healthier trees, and more abundant birds and insects.

Biologists use the term 'Flagship' to denote other important animal contributors to ecological health. Beavers construct dams which support wetlands, ponds for fish and fowl and insect habitant. Wolves, another flagship specie, were reintroduced into Yellowstone, in spite of protests from many. The result has been a healthier elk population and rebirth of the riverine flora and fauna.

For a variety of pragmatic reasons, the Y-2-Y biologists have focussed on Grizzly bears. In an attempt to prevent further decrease in their population they are attempting to link isolated islands of bear territory within the corridor to allow bears to move back into their historic habitant, which should allow mixing of genes and growth in population.

Although the benefit to the animals, flora and insects is immense, it is not the reason I was tempted to draft this essay. I was taken by the complexity of the task. For many American and Canadian citizens, a project such as this, neither affects them directly nor has any personal adverse consequence. They are indifferent because of distance and perhaps a pollyannish view of the natural world. But as you draw closer to the boundaries of the project, there are groups which find a project which diverts funds to protect bears, wolves and beavers, an abuse of tax dollars. Building crossovers and passages under highways to allow deer, fox, and pumas to pass safely to a nearby forest is using money which could be spent to assist people. Passing laws which prohibit or restrict hunting and fishing, on land which had traditionally been open season, is an infringement on personal rights. Industry, makes the claim that there will be increased costs and more dependence on foreign countries if there are restrictions on mining and logging. Adding more environmental rules, meant to reduce watershed pollution only increases the cost to the consumer. Complaints from land speculators who wish to build houses (low cost, of course), civil engineers who locate land fills and sewage ponds and even well-meaning guides and outfitters who seek more liberal public access to parks, all rail against projects such as Y-2-Y. If you define these groups as adversaries, you immediately envision a never-ending series of legal battles. Y-2-Y organizers have taken a different route, one that requires patience and buy-in by political, social, and environmental groups. Their web site lists at least 75 organizations and philanthropic agencies which are partners. Both The Governments of Canada and the United States have to believe that passive ecologic management is in their best interest. Provinces and States which benefit from resource extraction, must fend off the lure of increasing the number of permits and therefore foregoing tax income to satisfy a benefit which will not be appreciated by the vast majority of their populations.

In this age of reconciliation, Y-2-Y openly acknowledges that Indigenous rights and interests in the natural landscape must be considered, not only on Treaty and Reserve land but the entire ecosystem, which was their ancestral homeland.*

Y-2-Y sponsors workshops to explore new

conservation agreements between First Nations and national governments and Indigenous experts are invited to present lectures on landbased reconciliation. As an example, in late 2020, the Yellowstone to Yukon Conservation Initiative hosted a workshop series to discuss how Indigenous and non-Indigenous people and organizations can work together to create and sustain prosperous communities and healthy landscapes in British Columbia's Kootenay-Columbia region.

When one thinks of the complexity of dealing with two Federal Governments, Provincial, Territorial and State Legislatures, city and town by-laws and numerous planning boards, Departments of Transportation, and Agriculture, Indigenous reserves and Treaty rights, beef, sheep, and even bison ranchers, it would be understandable that you might say 'This can't be done.' But remarkably it is happening, slowly for sure, but it is moving forward. In fact, there are other natural expanses in North America and Europe which are studying and beginning to implement concepts such as Y-2-Y.

The Yellowstone to Yukon Wildlands Project is an example of a community of people with diverse ideologies having a common goal and working to implement it. The end result will be a better ecosystem not just for the flora and fauna that reside within its borders, but for us and our grandchildren.

So, I take it back- We Are Not Doomed!

FIGHTING ANTISEMITISM – An Important Behind The Scenes Look at What We Do...

To our wonderful Fraters,

We thought it might be nice for all of you to get a glimpse of some of the very important things that we do as an organization "behind the scenes" in addition to the amazing programming that we offer.

I hope that you all had a chance to attend one, or both, of the incredible webinars that our Advocacy Committee put together this year. But in addition to these webinars, we have met virtually with dental students from Western and U of T to let them know who we are as an organization and that we are there to support them should they have concerns or issues that they face at school. Luckily, there wasn't much action that needed to be taken on that front this year, but I did recently write two letters – one to U of T and one to the CDA to address some concerns that had come to our attention.

We were advised that U of T, Faculty of Dentistry, was hosting their Staff and Students Awards Night as well as a CE program on the first night of Passover. As such, we sent an email to Dean Tam to address our concerns and to see if these events could be moved as it essentially excluded the ability for Jewish students and staff alike from being able to participate. I am thrilled to report that Dean Tam was very responsive to our concerns and both her, the Dental Student Society, and the Advancement and Alumni Relations team were very apologetic for this oversight. In addition to their apologies, both events were rescheduled, even though it was on short notice. This was a win for us as an organization and our Jewish community! You will find the email exchange between Dean Tam and myself below and I was very happy to have such a swift and successful response from U of T, Faculty of Dentistry!

Unfortunately, on the opposite front, the Federation Dentaire International (FDI) World Dental Congress 2023 is being held in Australia September 24-27, 2023 and this falls on the holiest day of the year for Jewish people, Yom Kippur. Our International President, Dr. Gail Schupak wrote a letter to the American Dental Association voicing her concerns about this matter. The FDI and the Australian Dental Association issued an apology email that was sent out which I have included for those who may not have seen it. While an apology was issued, in my opinion it was a weak one and while they have "tried" to make concessions, they definitely did NOT address the true issue – especially since this is not the first time this has happened!! As such, I have written a letter to the Canadian Dental Association voicing our concerns with the apology that was issued. I urge you to read the letter below and while I have nothing to report back to you about as of yet, as your Line Officers, we felt it incumbent upon us to ensure that our members know the importance of an organization such as Alpha Omega. We are also reaching out to the other Canadian Chapter Presidents in hope of them sending similar letters.

These are only two examples of why it is <u>essential</u> that this organization stand strong as one because if we do not speak up – I fear that no one will!!

Email From Alpha Omega To Dr.Laura Tam...

Dear Dean Tam,

I hope this email finds you well. I am reaching out to you regarding two serious and time-sensitive concerns that have come to my attention. The University of Toronto, Faculty of Dentistry has scheduled the Staff and Student Awards night and a continuing education webinar on Wednesday April 5, 2023. Both of these events fall on the first night of Passover which is an important date in the Jewish Calendar where families gather to hold a seder. Passover is a well-known holiday and I think it is inappropriate and insensitive for the University to hold events like this on any religious holiday - regardless of the religion. While I understand that the CE webinar will be available online after the fact, the Awards night does not lend itself to the same solution.

Through my discussions with some faculty members, I understand that the DSS schedules the date for the Awards dinner and that the CE events are also organized by an independent body. Having said that, these are University of Toronto Dental Faculty events that I feel reflect poorly on a such a well-respected University and is sending the wrong message to both Jews and non-Jews alike. Holding an awards night on a night when few, if any, Jewish staff or students are able to attend, segregates them and sends the message that U of T is not concerned with their Jewish population. Sensitivity and respect to religious traditions of all faiths are foundational to the principles of equality, diversity and inclusivity; principles to which the University has clearly committed. Plans to hold events on dates that effectively exclude Jewish participation is problematic.

Ideally, we would ask that these events be rescheduled as to not exclude participation by persons of any faith. While I do recognize that it may be difficult to do at this point, I would strongly encourage you to consider both the long-term ramifications and messaging that is being sent out to your students, your faculty, and the community at large. To help prevent issues like this in the future, I will email you a list of Jewish holidays for the next 3 years for your convenience.

I look forward to your response.

Response From Dean Tam To Myself...

Dear Tammy,

Thank you for your email. I am sorry to hear about this, and want to assure you that we are working to resolve the concerns you have shared. Our guiding principle and intention across the board is to always ensure that all members of our community are included and that religious traditions of all faiths are respected and accommodated.

You are correct in that the Staff and Student Awards night and the Wealth Management Seminar are in fact organized by two different bodies of our Faculty – the DSS and the Advancement & Alumni Office respectively.

Regarding the DSS Awards night, please note the following personal note that I have received from the DSS president.

"I am reaching out to address the DSS Awards Night scheduling issue. The entire Dental Students' Society is regretful to learn of our error of omission by not factoring in Passover in our scheduling process for the upcoming DSS Awards Night. Before I continue, I want to reassure you that we are rescheduling the DSS Awards Night to a later date to ensure we are inclusive to all individuals who observe Passover. We will be notifying everyone of this change shortly, and will send further information on the new date and time as soon as we have made a determination.

We understand that we have potentially hurt or offended people of the Jewish community by this oversight. We are extremely sorry, and can assure you that this mistake was not done with intention. We also will learn from this mistake and ensure something like this never happens again. Please let me know if there is anything else we can do."

With respect to the Seminar, I have connected with the Advancement & Alumni Relations team who are also deeply apologetic and appreciative of you bringing the oversight to our attention. The Seminar too will be rescheduled for an alternative date, during which we hope that all members of our community who are interested in participating live will join us.

Being familiar with the religious observances of your community is an important part of promoting equity, diversity, and inclusion and we will address this oversight during our upcoming senior leadership team as well as with our academic scheduling officer and with the DSS.

I would like to assure you that the Jewish community is deeply valued at and the Faculty across the UofT. Your thoughts and feedback are always welcome Tammy, and I hope that you will accept my personal wishes for a peaceful and happy Passover.

Apology: FDI World Dental Congress 2023 and Yom Kippur date clash

FDI World Dental Federation (FDI) and the Australian Dental Association (ADA) wish to jointly state our sincere apologies that the annual World Dental Congress scheduled to take place in Sydney, Australia from 24 to 27 September 2023, clashes with Yom Kippur (24 to 25 September) the holiest day of the year in Judaism. In particular, we apologize whole heartedly for any offence it may have caused to our Jewish members, friends, colleagues and partners.

Whilst regretfully the global pandemic led to extremely limited availability of dates for this year's event, which was rescheduled from 2021, the FDI and ADA acknowledge that our shared core value of inclusivity has been compromised and we must do better to avoid such conflicts going forward. We have learned from this unfortunate situation and have committed to immediate and thorough due diligence, for all future congresses, meetings and events, to avoid dates of religious significance.

The FDI and ADA wish to sincerely thank key members of the Jewish dental community in Australia, with whom we have been working in order to find every solution possible to ensure the importance of Yom Kippur is truly respected. These include but are not limited to:

- Moving the Congress opening ceremony to prevent a clash with the Yom Kippur fast.
- Extending the trade show each night to allow our Jewish dentists, partners, exhibitors and colleagues to compensate for any time lost at the exhibition.
- Adjusting the main scientific programme to ensure Jewish speakers can observe Yom Kippur, and making exclusive plans for faith observances at the meeting venue.
- Liaising with the Great Synagogue (Orthodox Judaism) on Castlereagh Street Sydney, which as a result will now welcome out of town Jewish delegates to attend the Yom Kippur services.
- Contacting Temple Beth Emmanuel in Chatswood (Progressive / Reform Judaism) to inquire if Jewish delegates can attend their services during Yom Kippur.

While we recognize that this may not be the ideal outcome for our Jewish community, we thank you for your understanding of the incredibly difficult conference environment we face due to the pandemic, but most importantly seek to clarify how seriously the FDI and ADA have taken the issue, and sincerely hope that all affected find some solace in the solutions presented. Above all, we emphasise our commitment to not allowing this to occur again.

Dear Dr. Tomkins, Dr. Carr, and Dr. Antel,

I am writing to you regarding some serious concerns that I have with the upcoming Federation Dentaire International World Congress taking place in Sydney, Australia from September 24-27, 2023. I have seen the apology statement from the FDI and the ADA that was put out regarding the fact that this meeting is being held on Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the year in Judaism, and find their explanations to be objectionable on several fronts. Firstly, they have used the global pandemic as an excuse stating that there was extremely limited availability of dates for this year's event, which was rescheduled from 2021. Seeing as we are in 2023, I think that 2 years gives them a lot of dates to pick from and choosing the holiest day in the Jewish religion, or any religion for that matter, is completely unacceptable. They claim that the core values of both the ADA and the FDI is inclusivity, but actions often speak louder than words, and therefore, I find it difficult to believe that inclusivity is a core value when in 2015, the conference was held again over Yom Kippur. The conference ran September 22-25th and Yom Kippur was on September 23rd.

While the ADA and FDI have outlined several adjustments that they are making to try and be sensitive to, and accommodate, Jewish people at the 2023 conference, they finish their apology with the statement "Above all, we emphasize our commitment to not allowing this to occur again". Considering this is the second time this has occurred in the last 8 years, I find it difficult to take comfort in their professed commitment. To be frank, it almost appears as though they are simply placating people by putting a statement like this out.

As the current president of the Alpha Omega Dental Society's Toronto Chapter, I felt obligated to bring this to your attention and serve as the voice for all of our members and Jewish dentists worldwide. Alpha Omega is the oldest international dental organization and was founded in Baltimore Maryland in 1907 by a group of dental students to fight discrimination in dental schools. Sadly, we still find ourselves fighting the many different faces of discrimination making this organization as important today, as it was at its' inception.

I cannot imagine that this conference would be scheduled on the most religious holiday of any other religion and would expect that all holy days, regardless of religion, should be taken into consideration and avoided in situations like this.

I would ask that the Canadian Dental Association send a letter in support of the concerns raised considering it is the second time in less than a decade where the world congress meeting is being held on Yom Kippur.

I await your response to this problem so I can share it with my members.
